2019 NCCU Football Season Preview

Excitement around North Carolina Central University is soaring, as former NCCU football standout Trei Oliver enters his first season as head coach at his alma mater. The 20-year coaching veteran has been part of five conference championships and three black college football national titles as an assistant coach, and he is looking to reignite a proud gridiron championship culture in Durham.

Oliver and his newly appointed coaching staff will face the challenge of rebounding from the program's first losing record (5-6) since 2013. Although the Eagles benefit from 14 returning starters and a group of experienced letterwinners, they will have to learn new offensive and defensive systems, and develop chemistry with a wealth of newcomers who are expected to contribute to the success of this year's team.

"We have a lot of question marks," Oliver said heading into the 2019 campaign. "We bring in 105 players to fall camp, and 40 of them are first-year players at NCCU. So we are going to have to hurry up and figure things out."

Oliver's approach to spring practice was to get deeper, and evaluate the grit and determination of the student-athletes.

"We tried to develop some depth at all positions," he said. "I watched the guys compete and saw their work ethic improve throughout the spring. That was the biggest takeaway."

Oliver also witnessed his team come together.

"Our team chemistry is a lot better now," he said. "When we first arrived, very few guys were in the building. But now the guys are spending a lot more time with the coaches talking about life, more than just football."

In terms of goals for the upcoming season, Oliver did not talk about wins and losses, but instead shared what fans can expect to see on game days.

"I would like to see us put a disciplined, physical, competitive team on the field," said the former all-conference and all-region defensive back and punter at NCCU. "There are so many unknowns coming into the season, I'd just like to see us improve week in and week out."

on Oct. 27 at Delaware State. Two-time honoree as MEAC Offensive Player of the Week (Oct. 6, Oct. 20). Threw for a team-best 916 yards and 8 touchdowns. Averaged 130.9 passing yards per game, Completed 73 of 138 pass attempts (52.9%) with a pass efficiency rating of 126.3. Second on the team with 324 rushing yards, averaging 46.3 ground yards per game and 4.8 yards per carry. Ran for 3 touchdowns. Accounted for 1,240 yards of total offense, an average of 177.1 total yards per outing. Amassed 464 yards of total offense in a win over Howard (Oct. 6) with 311 yards and 3 touchdowns passing, along with 153 yards and a touchdown rushing, including the game-winning score with 24 seconds remaining. Completed the second-longest pass play in school history by connecting with tight end Sherman McLeod for a 93-yard touchdown at Norfolk State (Oct. 20).

Micah Zanders (R-Jr., 6-2, 200, Jacksonville, Fla.): Did not play in 2018. In 2017, started first 3 games of first campaign at NCCU before suffering a season-ending injury versus South Carolina State (Oct. 21). Completed 25 of 46 passes for 257 yards. Rushed for 49 yards on 18 carries. Best outing versus Shaw (Sept. 9), completing 14 of 25 passes for 161 yards, while adding 27 yards on the ground. Recorded 91 yards through the air on 10-for-17 passing in season-opener at Duke (Sept. 2).

Running Backs

Top Returners:

Isaiah Totten (R-Jr., 5-9, 195, Apex, N.C.): In two All-MEAC seasons (First Team in 2018; Second Team in 2017), has amassed 1,486 rushing yards to rank 15th on NCCU's career rushing list. Averaging 5.63 yards per carry with 12 career rushing touchdowns. In 2018, played in all 11 games, including 8 as a starter. Voted All-MEAC First Team. Earned Honorable Mention recognition on HERO Sports FCS Sophomore All-America Team. Ranked third in the conference in



rushing with 768 yards and 7 touchdowns, while averaging 5.5 yards per carry. Caught 19 passes for 105 yards. Amassed 190 rushing yards with 2 touchdowns at Bethune-Cookman (Nov. 8). Rushed for 133 yards and 2 scores versus Edward Waters (Nov. 3).

Jamal Currie-Elliott (R-Fr., 5-10, 185, Durham, N.C.): Played in 2018 season-opener versus Prairie View A&M (Sept. 2), but suffered an injury and did not return the play for the remainder of the season. Against Prairie View A&M in the MEAC/SWAC Challenge, amassed 62 all-purpose yards with 38 rushing yards and a touchdown, along with 2 receptions for 24 yards.

Recorded season-best 87 receiving yards on 6 grabs at Delaware State (Oct. 27).

Top Returners:

Darius Royster (R-Sr., 6-2, 215, Chesapeake, Va.): Played in all 11 games, including 9 as a starting defensive end. Voted All-MEAC Third Team. Led the MEAC and ranked ninth in the nation (FCS) with 4 forced fumbles. Tied for second in the conference and ranked 15th in the nation with a team-high 17.0 tackles for a loss, and tied for fifth in the league with a team-best 5.0 sacks. Finished third on the squad with 58 total takedowns, 39 of which were unassisted. Broke the school record for most tackles for loss in a game with 6.0 TFL among his season-best 10 total tackles versus Prairie View A&M (Sept. 2) in the MEAC/SWAC Challenge. Trei Oliver

Head Coach First Season at NCCU; First Year as Head Coach N.C. Central, 1998

With 20 years of college coaching experience that includes five conference championships and three black college football national titles,

Trei Oliver returned to his alma mater as North Carolina Central University's 24th head football coach, the university announced on Dec. 13, 2018.

A native of Yorktown, Virginia, Oliver earned all-conference and all-region honors as a defensive back and punter during his four-year playing career at NCCU from 1994-97. The 1998 graduate later returned to NCCU as an assistant coach from 2003-06, helping the Eagles to back-to-back Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) championships in 2005 and 2006.

Oliver returned to NCCU as head coach after spending the previous three seasons (2016-18) as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Southern University. The Jaguars are coming off a Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) West division championship and a trip to the SWAC championship game.

In the prior 15 seasons (2004-18) as a coach at four different universities, Oliver has been a part of only one season with fewer than seven wins. During that time, he has celebrated 124 victories for an average of more than eight triumphs per year and a winning percentage of .725.

Prior to Southern University, Oliver served as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at North Carolina A&T State University from 2011-15, when the Aggies shared consecutive Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) championships in 2014 and 2015, and were declared the black college football national champions in his final campaign in Greensboro as winners of the Celebration Bowl with a 10-2 overall record.

In four seasons at Grambling State University from 2007-10 as the outside linebackers coach, recruiting coordinator and special teams coordinator, the Tigers earned two SWAC West division crowns, and won the SWAC championship game and a black college football national title in 2008 with an 11-2 record.

Oliver's first coaching stint at NCCU was as a defensive backs and wide receivers coach, recruiting coordinator and special teams coordinator from 2003-06. The Eagles captured back-to-back CIAA championships with consecutive trips to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2005 and 2006, and were crowned as the black college football national champions following an 11-1 season in 2006.

Oliver started his college coaching career at Delaware State University as defensive backs coach and assistant special teams coordinator from 1999-2002.

As a student-athlete at NCCU, Oliver twice led the CIAA in punting, including a 41.7-yard average in 1997, which ranks fifth on the Eagles' all-time single season list. As a



junior in 1996, he was part of a defensive backfield that led the nation (NCAA Division II) in pass defense efficiency. As a senior, he landed two positions on the All-South Region Team, earning First Team honors as a defensive back and a Second Team selection as a punter.

Among NCCU's career leaders, Oliver ranks 13th with 234 tackles (126 solo), 12th with 31 passes defended (24 pass break-ups and seven interceptions), and fourth with a 39.3-yard punting average. He garnered All-CIAA first or second team honors in each of his four seasons.

Oliver graduated from NCCU in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He earned a master's degree in criminal justice from Grambling State University in 2010.

Both of his parents, Colon and Evelyn Oliver, are also NCCU graduates. His father played football as a wide receiver at NCCU from 1963-66.

He and his wife Yvette, also an NCCU graduate, are the proud parents of a son, Reggie.
